

# **Tulare County Office of Education After School Education and Safety Program**

## **Matching Funds**

Matching funds are actual cash or the cash value of services and/or resources obtained from another entity or provided by the grantee from funding sources other than ASES. Proposition 49/ASES require a 33% match of your grant. This match can be either in-kind or cash.

## **In-kind Matches**

To qualify as in-kind the following conditions apply:

- Must be necessary and reasonable for the accomplishment of project objectives
- Must be an allowable cost
- Must be applicable to the grant period to which the matching requirement applies
- Must be documented and verifiable
- Records must be maintained to support the valuation placed on the in-kind contribution
- Must not be used as match for another grant

Examples of In-kind Matches:

- Staffing (that is not paid for by your grant)
  - portion of time that managers – such as principals, district managers, executive directors and program managers – are spending in planning and overseeing the program
- Volunteers
- Janitorial Services
- Supplies
- Facilities (up to 25% of the match can be a calculation of the rental value of the space at the school or community facility that you are using)
- Field Trips

## **Other Funding Sources**

If an existing program will enhance or contribute services to the new after school program, it may be used as match.

Examples of other funding sources for possible match:

- Prevention Programs: Dropout Prevention and Recovery, California School Age Families Education Funds, HIV/AIDS Prevention Education Grant Program, Tobacco Use Prevention Education Funds, Mental Health Systems of Care, and others
- Learning Supports: 21<sup>st</sup> Century Community Learning Centers, Healthy Start local initiatives, Even Start Family Literacy, Service Learning/AmeriCorps, Child Care Food Program, SHAPE California Nutrition Grants, Garden Enhanced Nutrition Education Grants, Pupil Motivation and Maintenance Programs, and others
- School Safety: School Community Violence Prevention Grants, School Community Policing Partnerships, School Safety and Violence Prevention Grants, and others

- Youth Development: Conflict Resolution, Boys & Girls Clubs, 4H Programs, YWCA/YMCA, faith-based organizations, local businesses, city/county parks and recreation programs, Office of Child Abuse Prevention Grants, art, science, children's museums, and others
- Community Development: CalWORKs, Community Development Block Grants, California Conservation Corps, AmeriCorps, and other
- Education: Title I, High Priority Schools Grant, School Improvement Programs, School Library Materials, and others

Funds that cannot be used as match:

- State categorical funds for remedial education activities: High Priority Schools Grants, Economic Impact Aid, State Compensatory Education, State Program for LEP Students, Pupil Promotion and Retention Prevention, Mandatory Summer School, and Summer School.
