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Tulare County Office of Education Announces: Annual Tulare County Regional Science Olympiad Divisions B&C – College of the Sequoias – March 12, 2005 Division A – El Diamante High School – April 2, 2005

Science Olympiad tournaments are rigorous academic interscholastic competitions that consist of a series of individual and team events for which students prepare throughout the year. These events are balanced between the various science disciplines of biology, earth science, chemistry, physics and technology.

There is also a balance between science facts, process, skills and applications. Locally, over 550 students from more than 25 schools compete in the annual regional competitions held in the spring. The Science Olympiad is divided up into three divisions: Division A - grades 3 – 6; Division B - grades 6 – 9; and Division C - grades 9 – 12.

The B and C Divisions are held at the College of the Sequoias in Visalia, Saturday, March 12, 2005.

Students from sixth through twelfth grade will be launching rockets, building bridges, solving science crimes, designing experiments and participating in a variety of engaging scientific explorations.

Individual and team awards are presented with the top three teams in the B and C Divisions advancing to the NorCal State Science competition. The 2005 NorCal State Science competition will be held on April 9, 2005 at Sacramento State University.

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Division A is held at El Diamante High School, Visalia, on Saturday, April 2, 2005. Students from third through sixth grade will be building circuits, designing clay boats, dropping eggs to see if they survive, launching rockets and participating in fun-filled science activities. Individual and team awards will be presented at the conclusion of the event.

“The Science Olympiad is an impressive event,” says Tulare County Superintendent of Schools Jim Vidak, “because these students are using their own time in the pursuit of scientific discovery.” The events will begin with opening ceremonies at 8:00 a.m. Competitions will begin at 8:30 a.m. throughout the campus with the awards ceremony scheduled for 2:30 p.m.

Science Olympiad is an international non-profit organization devoted to improving the quality of science education, increasing student interest in science, and providing recognition for outstanding achievement in science education by both students and teachers.
