School Description and Mission Statement (School Year 2007-08)

This section provides information about the school's goals and programs.

The mission of the Tulare County Office of Education Court Schools is to enable high-risk youth to become responsible members of the community by developing skills in effective communication, critical thinking, ethical decision-making, and strategic planning.

The Tulare County Office of Education operates the two adjacent court schools, the Juvenile Detention Facility Court School (JDF) and the Youth Facility Court School (YF), which are chartered to provide incarcerated youth with an educational setting where they can develop academic, social, and life skills needed to successfully transition to their home schools and complete their education.

Parallel standards-based curriculum is provided to approximately 200 minors at the two schools, targeting passage of the California High School Exit Exam (CAHSEE) or General Education Development (GED) test. The academic program is geared to individual needs as addressed in the student's Individual Learning Plan (ILP). In small classes of a maximum of 18 at JDF and not exceeding 20 at the Youth Facility, the certified teaching staff presents lessons that accommodate diversity of academic and linguistic skills and learning styles while addressing state curricular standards. Imbedded in the instruction is character education which is also reinforced by literacy studies. There is a strong emphasis on technological applications in the classrooms to promote improved computer literacy, investigate career opportunities, and enhance presentation skills.

Opportunities for Parental Involvement (School Year 2007-08)

This section provides information about opportunities for parents to become involved with school activities.

Because students in the Court Schools are wards of the court, the primary contact for students while in custody is the Probation staff. For students receiving Special Education support, the parents attend the Individualized Education Program (IEP) team meetings and participate in developing a plan to facilitate their student's achievement. The Court School staff also provides ongoing support to parents. The organization of the School Site Advisory Group (SSAG) provides an avenue of communication for parents through the submission of questions and concerns to the group for discussion. This advisory group developed the Single Plan for Student Achievement which targets weak academic areas and underperforming subgroups, and the group adjusts that plan to reflect testing results.

Academic Performance Index

XII. Instructional Planning and Scheduling Professional Development

This section provides information on the annual number of school days dedicated to staff development for the most recent three-year period.

There are three annual school days dedicated to Court School staff development. The primary focus for staff development is instructional strategies to promote literacy and numeracy within the incarcerated youth population. Two in-services are provided yearly to the entire staff dealing with the key areas of interpreting data and directing instruction in the CAHSEE/GED prioritized areas of reading and math; specialists from the County Office of Education have assisted in these presentations as well as experts in the field. All staff members have attended the Language Arts workshop series on providing modifications for all students. In addition, individual needs for professional development are determined by annual staff surveys, and specific workshops, classes, and conferences are arranged to meet those needs; teachers can request three days of such coursework as indicated on their individualized professional plan. Particular attention has been directed towards utilizing technological courses offered through the Tulare County Office of Education in order to upgrade computer skills and enhance technological curricular applications. As well, this year math teachers have been provided additional professional opportunities in both algebra instruction and math specialization through the County Office of Education.
